## How to Spend Your Free Time in New York City

### West Side/Central Park

- **Times Warner Shopping Mall** 10 Columbus Circle - (Lower left corner of Central Park)  
Time Warner Center has transformed Columbus Circle into a thriving urban neighborhood. The soaring 2.8 million square foot vertical mixed-use property is home to The Shops at Columbus Circle. With over 40 specialty retailers, a 60,000 square foot Whole Foods Market, a 40,000 square foot square foot Equinox Fitness Club and The Restaurant and Bar Collection featuring world-renowned chefs Thomas Keller, Masa Takayama, Michael Lomonaco, Marc Murphy and nightlife entrepreneur Rande Gerber makes Time Warner Center the city's most stylish and sophisticated destination.
- **LDS Temple and Lincoln Center** - 125 Columbus Ave, New York, NY 10023 - (Broadway and 66th Street) Lincoln Center is home of NYC Ballet, Metropolitan Opera, NY Philharmonic and Julliard School of Music. Across the street is the Manhattan LDS Temple and chapel.
- **Soup Nazi from Seinfeld** - (8th Ave and 55th) Longtime counter-serve chain ladling out soup made famous by "Seinfeld," plus sandwiches & salads.
- **Strawberry Fields** (72nd St at west side of Central Park) Central Park is a beautiful part of Manhattan and this area right near 72nd street on the West Side is a great place to start a tour of the park. It was named after a Beatles' song and was dedicated on Lennon's 45th birthday. It is a lovely quiet spot with a Zen-like feel.
- **Renting Bikes at Central Park**  
Offering both hilly and flat terrain, Central Park provides cyclists with varying levels of difficulty. Circling the entire Park, the drives provide three long-distance routes of 6.1 miles, 5.2 miles or 1.7 miles. There are shorter distances if you cross the Park at a number of scenic locations. Look for bike rentals near Columbus Circle at the lower west side of Central Park.
- **Metropolitan Museum of Natural History** (79th Street and Central Park West)  
The American Museum of Natural History (abbreviated as AMNH), located on the Upper West Side of Manhattan in New York City is one of the largest and most celebrated museums in the world. Located in park-like grounds across the street from Central Park, the Museum comprises 25 interconnected buildings that house 46 permanent exhibition halls, research laboratories, and its renowned library. Admission:

### East Side Central Park

- **The Plaza** -(58th Street and 5th Avenue) This 19th Century landmark luxury hotel is known for posh dining and afternoon teas.

- **Central Park - Heart of the Park Tour** -2:00 PM to 3:30 PM - (Thursday) This free tour of Central Park is a 90 minute tour. Book online in advance for more information and to get tickets. Meeting Location: In front of the Samuel F. B. Morse statue, inside the Park at 72nd Street and Fifth Avenue
- **Central Park Zoo, the Pond, and Horse Carriage Rides.** There are lots of cool monuments and statues to see along the walking paths in Central Park.
- **The Frick Collection** - 5th Avenue and 70th Street - Wednesday from 2:00 - 6:00 p.m. is pay what you wish museum admission.
- **Metropolitan Museum of Art** (5th Avenue and 82th Street)  
One of New York City's most popular tourist attractions, the Metropolitan Museum of Art welcomes over 5 million visitors a year. The Metropolitan Museum of Art's collection and special exhibits offer something for everyone -- from Ancient Egyptian Vases and Roman Statues to Tiffany Stained Glass and Rembrandt Paintings there is something for nearly everyone. If you're overwhelmed by the sheer size and breadth of the Metropolitan Museum of Art's collection, take a **Highlights Tour**; Offered throughout the day, these volunteer led one hour tours are a great introduction to the Museum's collections (free with admission) Admission: \$25 for adults, \$17 for seniors, and \$12 for students.

### Theatre District

- **Father Duffy Square** Red Steps - The northern triangle of Times Square, located between 45th and 47th Streets, Broadway and Seventh Avenue, Can be a great meeting place.
- **Carlos Bakery** - 42nd and 8th Ave - "Cake Boss" Buddy Valastro's bakery is known for a variety of cookies, cannoli & elaborate cakes.
- **Broadway** - Walk up and down Broadway from 42nd Street to 50th street for lots of people watching and shopping. Theatres dot each street in this area.

### Midtown

- **Rockefeller Center** 45 Rockefeller Plaza (49th Street between 5th and 6th Avenues) Famous complex that's home to TV studios, plus a seasonal ice rink & giant Christmas tree.
- **St. Patrick Cathedral 5th Avenue and 50th Street** - One of New York's most beautiful cathedrals. Built in 1850, check out the fantastic Gothic architecture and art inside the cathedral. This is a must see!
- **St. Bartholomew's Church** - Park Avenue and 51st Street. Built in 1835 by the same architect as St. Patrick's Cathedral. Just a couple blocks away from St. Patrick's.
- **Radio City Music Hall** 6th Avenue and 51st Street - right next door to the Rockefeller Center.
- **Trump Tower** - 5th Avenue and 57th Street - Donald Trump's mixed-use skyscraper, containing offices, shops, eateries, condos & a public atrium.
- **Upscale Shopping** (5th Avenue between 47th and 58th Street) For the best window shopping, walk up 5th Avenue from around 47th Street)
- **Carnegie Hall** (57<sup>th</sup> street and 7<sup>th</sup> avenue, 881 7th Ave, New York, NY 10019) Its remarkable architectural design and incredible legacy has made Carnegie Hall a national historic landmark and vital cultural center. Carnegie Hall offers tours from October through late May. All tours are subject to the Hall's performance and rehearsal schedule. Public walk-in tours are offered Monday through Friday at 11:30 AM, 12:30 PM, 2 PM, and 3 PM; Saturday at 11:30 AM and 12:30 PM; and Sunday at 12:30 PM. Please arrive early to purchase tickets at the Box Office; availability is limited.
- **New York Public Library** (5<sup>th</sup> avenue and 42<sup>nd</sup> Street) Free wifi throughout the library. Head for the reading rooms on the third floor; plenty of tourists stop by the central corridor to sit and pose as if studying/reading or just snap lots of photos.
- **Grand Central Terminal** (42<sup>nd</sup> street and Park Avenue) Grand Central Terminal (often inaccurately referred to as Grand Central Station) is a beautiful Beaux-arts building in midtown Manhattan. First opened in 1913, Grand Central Terminal underwent a massive restoration to restore it to its former glory, and is now both a transportation hub, as well as a destination in

itself for visitors to New York City. Atop the station is Campbell Apartment, '30s tycoon John W. Campbell's hideaway office and a luxurious escape from the bustle below. For great dining views, check out Michael Jordan's Steak House on the west side of the concourse and Metrazur on the east.

- **Museum of Modern Art (11 W 53<sup>rd</sup> St. New York, New York)** Fantastic works of art including Van Gough's Starry Night and works by Pablo Picasso. Bring your student I.D. and only pay \$14 for admission. If you're 16 and under enjoy free admission. Adult Admission: Adults \$25.

### **Herald Square Area (34th Street)**

- **Madison Square Garden** - 34th Street and 8th Avenue - Billed as the "world's most famous arena", this icon hosts pro sports, concerts & other big events.
- **Penn Station** -34th Street and 7th Avenue - Major city & interstate rail-transit hub beneath Madison Square Garden, with restaurants & shops.
- **Macy's Dept. Store at Herald Square** (34th Street between Broadway and 6th Avenue) You can find whatever you are looking for there. Even has a wooden escalator. Many places to eat at Macys even McDonald's and Aunt ems so you can eat and shop
- **Manhattan Mall** (33rd Street and 6th Ave) - Just downtown from Macy's. This mall has more typical mall shopping.
- **Empire State Building - (5th Avenue and 34th Street)** - Iconic, art deco office tower from 1931 with exhibits & observatories on the 86th & 102nd floors.

### **Uptown/West Side**

- **Columbia University** - (116 and Broadway) Set in Upper Manhattan, this 1754 Ivy League school focuses on medicine, business, the arts & more.
- **Hamilton Grange National Memorial** Alexander Hamilton built this home for his family in Harlem. (414 West 141st Street) Wednesday - Sunday 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Take the #1 Train to 137 street
- **St. John the Divine Church** - the largest Cathedral in North America.
- **The Riverside Church** - Beautiful church on the upper west side. Easy walk from St. John the Divine.
- **Cloisters Art Museum** - (Very top of Manhattan near Broadway) Medieval Art in a rebuilt Monastery with views of the Hudson River.

### **Lower West Side**

- **Chelsea Market** - Enter at 15th Street and 9th Avenue. This is a great mall for foodies with unique shops and restaurants. Cool shopping and eating. Exit the other side and walk to the highline park trail.
- **Highline Trail** - Enter at 16th Street and 10th Avenue - This is a long narrow urban park. Walk uptown from here as long as you want. You can walk all the way up to 34th Street.
- **Greenwich Village** - South of 14th Street - Walk to Washington Square Park and see New York's Eiffel Tower, buy an edible raw Cookie Do' treat and check out New York University. This area is the epicenter of the city's 1960s counterculture movement.
- **Cookie Do' - 550 LaGuardia Pl** - Sweet shop devoted to cookie dough served by the pint, in sundaes and mixed into other desserts.
- **Domenique Ansel Bakery** - 189 Spring St - for the best french bakery in the city, walk a little farther downtown to try some creative and beautiful french treats. (Cronuts, DK's)

### **Lower East Side**

- **Tenement Museum** - 103 Orchard St - Schedule a guided visit to this museum ahead of time online for a guided tour with your small group. This is a great educational experience you won't regret. Admission: \$25 Adult, \$20 Student.
- **Southstreet Seaport Museum** - 12 Fulton Street - This museum has 5 historic ships for tours. Walking tours and late afternoon sails are available at the museum. There are a variety of tours such as walking tours, historic ship tours, boat cruises, etc....Check online for admission prices.

### Brooklyn

- **Brooklyn Art Museum** - Open late until 10:00 pm Thursday. Adult admission \$16, Ages 19 and under Free admission. Rodin exhibit.
- **Brooklyn City Hall** - It was completed in 1848 to be used as the [City Hall](#) of the former [City of Brooklyn](#). In January 1898 the independent City of Brooklyn merged with the [City of New York](#), and Kings County became the Borough of [Brooklyn](#), at which time the building became Brooklyn Borough Hall.

### Downtown/Wall Street

- **Charging Bull** - Charging Bull, which is sometimes referred to as the Wall Street Bull or the Bowling Green Bull, is a bronze sculpture that stands in Bowling Green in the Financial District in Manhattan, New York City
- **Wall Street** - is an eight-block-long street running roughly northwest to southeast from Broadway to South Street, at the East River, in the Financial District of Lower Manhattan in New York City.
- **Trinity Church** - **an active Episcopal Parish that has been an integral part of New York City's history for more than 300 years**
- **St. Paul's Church** - Manhattan's oldest church, and a key place of refuge for relief workers in the weeks following the September 11 attacks, celebrated its 250th birthday on Sunday. George Washington visited to pray just after he took the oath of office at Federal Hall on Wall Street on April 30, 1789.
- **911 Memorial and Museum** - **The Museum tells the story of 9/11 through interactive technology, archives, narratives and a collection of artifacts. Learn about the two core exhibitions and see other areas of the 110,000 square feet of museum space.**
- **Freedom Tower One World Observatory** - **ascend to the top of the tallest building in the Western Hemisphere in less than 60 seconds; look toward the horizon and feel the City's invincible spirit. Admission \$34**
- **Federal Hall** - **built in 1700 as New York's City Hall, later served as the first capitol building of the United States of America under the Constitution, as well as the site of George Washington's inauguration as the first President of the United States under the Constitution. It was also where the United States Bill of Rights was introduced to the first U.S. Congress.**
- **Alexander Hamilton U.S. Custom House** - Circa-1907 National Historic Landmark housing the Museum of the American Indian & a federal court. Museum Admission: Free
- **Federal Reserve Bank of New York** - The building also hosts a vault containing the world's largest depository of gold, stored on behalf of numerous government institutions from around the world.
- **Fraunces Tavern** - the city's oldest building, where George Washington bid farewell to his troops. Museum admission \$7 Adults, \$4 Students.
- **Staten Island Ferry** - The ferry operates 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, running every 15 to 20 minutes during peak hours and every 30 minutes at other times. Free of charge with great views of NY Harbor and Statue of Liberty.
